Big Three Buying Into Holman County's Big Cotton Plots

Agrocentor, a Chinese/Kuwait/Brazilian corporate farming consortium, is buying cotton land in Holman County. According to an anonymous source, the corporate farming company is targeting approximately 90 sections.

Some purchases have been made, the rest targeted for the end of the year. If the consortium closes all the deals, they'll be paying just over three million dollars, averaging \$4700 per acre.

Farmers who have agreed to Agrocentor's terms had to sign non-disclosure agreements in effect until all negotiations are complete. Agrocentor operates cotton farming properties in the Gulf Coast, Brazil and Kuwait, according to the company's website.

Had the land rush happened forty years ago, it would have displaced more than eighty traditional farmers and their families. In the last decade, the average farmer can operate two sections because of increased mechanization. Many of the plots on the market are operated by leasers, who contract with aerial sprayers, harvesters and haulers to bring the crops to market; not so much different than the way any manufacturer does business.



This shows the cotton farming areas in Holman County, about a third of the county's 1200 square miles. According to The USDA Marketing service, The price for cotton in Texas is around 60.76 cents per pound as of late November 2023, but prices vary daily. A standard 500pound bale of cotton is valued at approximately \$303.80 based on this price.

Jerrod and nearby towns will reap part of the benefits of the buyouts. The average dollar rolls through goods and services in home communities before its absorbed in the economy, That's assuming part of the windfall is spent locally. Not entirely a safe bet.
